	1. A Schoolboy named PUGLOO wakes up one morning and finds that a circus troupe has pitched a tent in front of his house. It is summer vacations and Pugloo has planned to sleep late every morning. But the loud music played at the circus keeps him awake till late at night and the loud noise of rehearsals awakens him at dawn. Pugloo has been taught about freedom of speech and expression in school. He has understood it to mean that he cannot object to the noise of the circus. He is quite upset.	
	2. In a new comic series created by Ahmedabad-based lawyer sister—Kelly 27 and Kanan, Pugloo learns fundamental rights and fundamental duties. Law and legal cases are so hard for the general public to understand. We thought a graphic book series would help children become familiar, at least with the basics, say the two sisters. Kelly, an Oxford University student, and Kanan, a graduate of the London School of Economics, named their comic series LAWTOONS and put it up on a crowd-funding website for donations. In June this year, after a nail-biting wait of three months, they reached their target of Rs 2,75,000/ The first volume in the series is now set for release soon.	
	3. With a comic series, the sisters realized that they could take some of the basic knowledge about the law to a wider audience. First, they created a ten-page prototype which they tested on two municipal and three private schools in Ahmedabad over six months. A total of two hundred students from the five schools attended sessions and the	

results were positive. Students identified with the character Pugloo and seemed excited to learn about the law, says Krishna Panchal, an activist associated with the testing of Lawtoons. 4. In order to make the comic series effective and interesting, a group of legal experts and animation and design specialists helped structure the stories and their depiction. This team included Sekhar Mukherjee, head of animation film design at the National Institute of Design (NID). Ahmedabad and Margie Sastry, writer and former associate editor and Amar Chitra Katha. The law is complicated, even for professional lawyers sometimes. Lawtoons helps make it easier and more fun for children to understand basics at a very young age, says Bhadrish Raju, who is now working to have Lawtoons introduced as reading material at iuvenile homes. 5. 	1. Following the onset of industrialisation and the sustained urban growth of large population centres, the build-up of waste in the cities has caused a rapid deterioration in levels of sanitation and the general quality of urban life. The streets are gradually becoming choked with filth due to the lack of waste clearance regulations. So keeping cities clean is essential for keeping the residents healthy. Our health depends not just on personal hygiene and nutrition, but critically also on how clean we keep our cities and our surroundings. The spread of dengue	ks

and chikungunya is intimately linked to the deteriorating state of public health conditions in our cities.

- 2. Waste management is the complete process of handling, processing, transporting, storage, recycling and disposal of human, industrial and environmental waste. Waste management is a global phenomenon, but its ramifications are more prominent in developing countries.
- 3. The good news is that waste management to keep cities clean is now getting attention through the "Swachh Bharat Mission" in our country. However, much of the attention begins and stops with the brooms and the dustbins, extending at most to the collection and transportation of the mixed waste to some distant or not so distant place, preferably out of sight.
- 4. The challenge of processing and treating the different streams of solid waste and safe disposal of the residuals in scientific landfills have received much less attention in municipal solid waste management than is expected from a health point of view. Weak institutions, chronic under-resourcing and rapid urbanization are major challenges to the waste management in a developing country like India.
- 5. One of the problems is that instead of focusing on waste management for health, we have got sidetracked into "waste for energy". If only we were to begin by not mixing the biodegradable component of solid waste (close to 60 percent of the total) in our cities with the dry waste, and instead using this stream of waste for composting and producing a gas called methane.
- 6. Waste collection and disposal methods vary widely among different countries and regions. For example, curbside collection is the most common method of disposal in most European countries, Canada, New Zealand and many other parts of the developed world in which waste is collected at regular intervals by specialised trucks. Domestic waste collection services are often provided by the local government authorities, or by private companies for industrial and commercial waste. Some areas, especially those in less developed countries, do not have formal waste-collection systems.
- 7. In major areas of our country, city compost from biodegradable waste provides an alternative to farmyard manure (like cow-dung). It provides an opportunity to simultaneously clean up our cities and help improve agricultural productivity and quality of the soil. Organic manure or compost plays a very important role as a supplement to chemical fertilisers in enriching the nutrient-deficient soils. City compost can be the new player in the field.

- 8. Benefits of compost to the farm are well-known. The water holding capacity of the soil which uses compost helps in drought-proofing, and the requirement of less water per crop is a welcomed feature for a water-stressed future. By making the soil porous, use of compost also make roots stronger and resistant to pests and decay. Farmers using compost, therefore, need less quantity of pesticides. There is also an evidence to show,that horticulture crops grown with compost have better flavour, size, colour and shelf-life.
- 9. City compost has the additional advantage of being weed-free, unlike farmyard manure which brings with it the seeds of undigested grasses and requires a substantial additional labour cost for weeding as the crops grow. City compost is also rich in organic carbon, and our soils are short in this. Farmers clearly recognize the value of city compost. If city waste was composted before making it available to the farmers for applying to the soil, cities would be cleaned up and the fields around them would be much more productive.
- 10. Quite apart from cleaning up the cities of biodegradable waste, this would be a major and sustainable contribution to improving the health of our soil without further damage by excessive chemical inputs. What a marvellous change from waste to health!
- 11. The good news is that some states are regularly laying plastic roads. Plastic roads will not only withstand future monsoon damage but will also solve a city's problem of disposal of non-recyclable plastic. It is clear that if the mountains of waste from our cities were to be recycled into road construction material, it would tackle the problem of managing waste while freeing up scarce land.
- 12. The government should initiate awareness campaigns and advertisements informing people about the adverse effects of excess waste. New and advanced technology should be used for the disposal of waste. Maximum recycling and reuse of the waste should be encouraged. Waste management is the call of the hour.
